

Click **Edit** > **Advanced Search**. Enter the keyword (text) for information you want to find in the search window, and then click **Search**. Hits are displayed as a list. Click one of the displayed hits to jump to that page.




Jumping Directly from Bookmarks

• Mac OS: Hold down the command key, and then press ←.




Printing Only the Pages You Need

- The Epson Projector Content Manager software allows you to create playlists and save them on an external storage device. You can also add color and shape effects to your projected image, and schedule playlists. See the *Epson Projector Content Manager Operation Guide* for details.
- Epson Web Control allows you to create playlists using a Web browser and save them to an external storage device connected to a projector on a network. You can also add color and shape effects to your projected image.
- The Epson Creative Projection app allows you to create content on iOS devices. You can also transfer content to the projector wirelessly.



You can adjust the angle of the projector using the ball joint so that you can project in various directions.







Setting Up the Projector

Use the mount supplied to install the projector on a wall or ceiling.

Optional mounts are necessary to install the projector on lighting tracks or to install it on the floor or a table.

Note the following points when selecting a projector location:

- Place the projector on a sturdy, level surface or install it using a compatible mount.
- Leave plenty of space around and under the projector for ventilation, and do not place it on top of or next to anything that could block the vents.

Marning

- Do not use or install the projector where it may be subject to water or rain, or high humidity, such as outdoors, in a bathroom, or shower room, and so on. Otherwise, it could cause a fire or electric shock.
- A special method of installation is required when installing the projector on a wall or ceiling. Contact a qualified technician to install the projector. If you do not install the projector correctly, it could fall and cause damage or injury.
- Do not use adhesives on the fixing points for the mounts to prevent the screws from loosening, or use lubricants, oils, or similar substances on the projector; the projector case may crack causing it to fall from its mount. This could cause serious injury to anyone under the mount and could damage the projector.
- Failure to install the ceiling mount and projector may cause the projector to fall. After installing the specific Epson mount that supports your projector, make sure you secure the mount to all of the projector's ceiling mount fixing points. Also, secure the projector and the mounts using the safety wire supplied with the projector or an optional wire.
- Do not install the projector in a location subject to high levels of dust or humidity, or in a location subject to smoke or steam. Otherwise, it could cause a fire or electric shock to occur.

Marning

- When adjusting the orientation of the projection unit, make sure that the projected light does not fall on the projector's power supply section. If projected light falls on the projector, it may become hot causing an injury or fire to occur.
- Do not cover the projector's air intake or air exhaust vents. If the vents are covered, the internal temperature could rise and cause a fire.
- Do not use or store the projector in locations where it will be subject to dust or dirt. Otherwise, the quality of the projected image may decline, and it could cause a malfunction or fire.
- Do not install the projector on an unstable surface or in a location beyond the weight specifications of the projector. Otherwise, it could fall or topple causing an accident and injury.
- Do not use adhesives to prevent the screws from loosening, or use lubricants, oils, or similar substances on the ball joint. Otherwise, the strength that is necessary to hold the projection unit in place decreases which could cause an accident or injury to occur.
- Do not install in locations where salt damage could occur, or in locations subject to corrosive gas such as sulphuric gas from hot springs. Otherwise, corrosion could cause the projector to fall. It could also cause the projector to malfunction.



Caution

Make sure you install the optional Floor Stand when placing the projector on the floor.

Attention

- If you are using the projector at altitudes above 1,500 m, set the High Altitude **Mode** setting to **On** in the projector's menu to ensure the projector's internal temperature is regulated properly.
- Extended > Operation > High Altitude Mode
- The cable connecting the power supply unit and the projection unit is wrapped in plastics at the time of purchase. Make sure you remove the plastics before using the projector.

Notes on Transporting

There are many glass parts and precision components inside the projector. To prevent damage due to impacts when transporting, handle the projector as follows.


Attention

- To move it closer, turn off the projector and unplug all of the wires.
- When transporting, as well as the precautions above, prepare the following and contact your courier:
 - Make sure there is no SD card inserted in the projector.
 - Tighten the ball joint screw completely to prevent the projector from moving during transportation.
 - Protect the outside of the projector so that it does not receive any impacts during transportation.
 - Place the projector in a sturdy box and indicate on the box that it is a precision instrument.


Projector Setup and Installation Options

You can set up or install your projector in the following ways:

Mounted on a ceiling or lighting track




Mounted on a wall





- Use the Direct Mount (supplied) only when installing on a ceiling or wall.
- If installing on a lighting track, use only the optional Lighting Track Mount.
- When installing on a ceiling or wall, we recommend a horizontal ceiling or a vertical wall. See the *Installation Guide* for details.

Placed on the floor or on a table





- Use the optional Floor Stand to install on the floor or a table.
- Do not install on the floor or a table using the Direct Mount supplied.
- Place the projector on a level and stable location.

Do not install the projector in a location that does not allow air to circulate, such as on a shelf or in a box.





- When installing the projector on a ceiling or wall, make sure it is not close to the air exhaust vent of an air conditioner.

If you are installing multiple projectors next to each other, make sure hot air from the exhaust vent does not go into the air intake vent of another projector.


Projection Distance

The distance at which you place the projector from the screen determines the approximate size of the image. The image size increases the farther the projector is from the screen, but can vary depending on the zoom factor, aspect ratio, and other settings.

See the Appendix for details about how far to place the projector from the screen based on the size of the projected image.



When correcting keystone distortion, your image is slightly smaller.

Adjusting the Projection Angle Using the Ball Joint

You can adjust the projection angle using the ball joint.



A Caution

- Make sure you do not trap your fingers in the ball joint.
- Do not force the projection unit to move after tightening the ball joint screw.

Attention


Make sure you support the bottom of the projection unit so that it does not move, and tighten the screw with the hexagonal wrench supplied (diagonal size 5.0 mm).

Projector Placement




We recommend adjusting the projection angle and setting the focus and zoom at least 20 minutes after you start projecting, because images are not stable right after turning on the projector.

- Press the power button on the remote control to turn on the projector.
- 2 Loosen the ball joint screw using a hexagonal wrench.




Attention

• If you loosen the screw while the projection unit is tilted, the projection unit may move suddenly under its own weight. When loosening the screw, make sure you support the projector's projection unit so that the projector does not move suddenly.



- Do not grip the ball joint when loosening the screw. Otherwise, your fingers could get trapped.
- Adjust the projection angle.


- Do not apply excessive force to the cables connected to the projector.
- Do not wind cables around the ball joint. Otherwise, the cables could be damaged.



You can rotate the projection unit 360 degrees horizontally and 90 degrees vertically. You can also tilt the image 90 degrees in either direction.

After you finish making adjustments, tighten the ball joint screw that you loosened.





- When retightening the screw using the included hexagon wrench, do not use the ball point side of the wrench.
- Adjust the size and focus after changing the projection position.
- Displaying the test pattern makes it easier to adjust the projection position.




Connecting to a Computer

If your computer has an HDMI port, you can connect it to the projector using an HDMI cable and send the computer's audio with the projected image.



To connect a Mac that does not have an HDMI port, you need an adapter that allows you to connect to the projector's HDMI port. Contact Apple for compatible adapter options. Older Mac computers (2009 and earlier) may not support audio through the HDMI port.

- 1 Connect the HDMI cable to your computer's HDMI output port.
- Connect the other end to the projector's HDMI port.

Connecting to an HDMI Video Source


If your video source has an HDMI port, you can connect it to the projector using an HDMI cable and send the image source's audio with the projected image.

Attention

Do not turn on the video source before connecting it to the projector. Doing so could damage the projector.



- If the port on the device you connect has an unusual shape, use the cable supplied with the device or an optional cable to connect to the projector.
- The cable differs depending on the output signal from the connected video devices.

Projector Connections



- Connect a Bluetooth device that supports copyright protection (SCMS-T).
- You may not be able to connect depending on the standard and type of device.
- Even when connecting within the specified communication distance, connections can be lost due to the status of the signal.
- The communication method for Bluetooth uses the same frequency (2.4 GHz) as wireless LAN (IEEE802.11b/g/n) or microwave ovens. Therefore, if these devices are used at the same time, radio wave interference may occur, the audio may be interrupted, or communication may not be possible. If you do need to use these devices at the same time, make sure there is enough distance between them and the Bluetooth device.
- You cannot connect multiple Bluetooth devices to the projector at the same time.




Attaching and Removing the Cable Clips

You can insert the cable clips so that the power cord and HDMI cable do not disconnect under their own weight.




Connect the power cord and HDMI cable to the projector.


Insert the end of each cable clip anchor into the cable clip attachment point beside the each port.

To remove the cable clips, open the clips and disconnect the cables. Then pinch the sides of each cable clip anchor and carefully pull them out of the cable clip attachment points. The remote control uses the two AA batteries that came with the projector.



The remote control lets you control the projector from almost anywhere in the room.

Make sure that you aim the remote control at the projector's receivers within the distance and angles listed here.







Avoid using the remote control in conditions with bright fluorescent lights or in direct sunlight, or the projector may not respond to commands. If you are not going to use the remote control for a long time, remove the batteries.



Turning On the Projector

Turn on the computer or video equipment you want to use after you turn on the projector.

Connect the power cord to the projector's power inlet and plug it into an electrical outlet.





When the projector is installed on a lighting track, the projector enters standby status when you turn on the power to the lighting track.

The projector's power indicator turns blue. This indicates that the projector is receiving power, but is not yet turned on (it is in standby mode).

Press the power button on the remote control to turn on the projector. The status indicator flashes blue as the projector warms up. Once the projector is warmed up, the status indicator stops flashing and turns blue.

Try the following if you do not see a projected image.

- Turn on the connected computer or video device.
- Change the screen output from the computer when using a laptop computer.
- Insert a DVD or other video media, and press play (if necessary).
- Press the button for the desired video source on the remote control.

Marning

- Never look into the projector lens when the laser is on. This can damage your eyes and is especially dangerous for children and pets.
- When turning on the projector at a distance using the remote control, make sure there is no one looking into the lens.
- Do not allow small children to operate the projector. Children must be accompanied by an adult.
- During projection, do not block the light from the projector with a book or other objects. If the light from the projector is blocked, the area on which the light shines becomes hot which could cause it to melt, burn, or start a fire. Also, the lens may get hot due to the reflected light which could cause the projector to malfunction. To stop projection, use the A/V Mute function, or turn off the projector.
- Do not open the projector's case. Never disassemble or remodel the projector. There are high-voltage components inside the projector that could cause fire, electric shock, or an accident.
- If an error occurs, disconnect the power cord from the electrical outlet, and contact Epson for help. If you continue using the projector as it is, it could cause an electric shock, fire, or even damage to eyesight.



Caution

Do not place objects that may become warped or otherwise affected by heat near the air exhaust vent and do not put your face or hands near the vent while projection is in progress.

Attention

Try not to touch the lens section with your hand or fingers. If fingerprints or oils are left on the surface of the lens, projection quality deteriorates.



- When the **Direct Power On** setting is set to **On** in the projector's **Extended** menu, the projector turns on as soon as you plug it in. Note that the projector also turns on automatically in cases such as recovery from a power outage.
 - Extended > Operation > Direct Power On
- If you select a specific port as the **Auto Power On** setting in the projector's **Extended** menu, the projector turns on as soon as it detects a signal or cable connection from that port.
 - Extended > Operation > Auto Power On
- About the LCD panel
 - When a high-powered laser beams through the surface of the projection lens even when it is not being used, it can cause a malfunction in the LCD panel.
 - If the same image is projected for an extended period, burning may occur on the LCD panel. Use Refresh Mode in the projector's Reset menu to reduce screen burn.

- Turn off this product when it is not in use to prolong the life of the projector. Light source life varies depending on the mode selected, environmental conditions, and usage. Brightness decreases over time.
- If the **Light Source Calibration** setting is set to **Run Periodically** in the projector's **Reset** menu, light source calibration starts automatically if you turn off the projector and the following conditions are present:
- 100 hours have passed since the last light source calibration
- You have used the projector continuously for more than 20 minutes
- Since the projector supports the direct shutdown feature, it can be turned off directly using the breaker.
- Press the power button on the projector or remote control.

- Press the power button again. (To leave it on, press any other button.)

Image Shape

For the best quality images, we recommend adjusting the installation position of the projector to achieve the correct image size and shape.




To correct the distortion in the horizontal and vertical directions independently, use the [Keystone] button on the remote control.







You can use the **Image Shift** feature to adjust the image position without moving the projector.




• This feature is not available if the digital zoom is set to the widest setting.



- Turn on the projector and display an image.
- Adjust the image size using the [Zoom] buttons on the remote control. When the projector uses optical zoom, you need to switch to digital zoom by reducing the size of the image until a message is displayed.






Image Aspect Ratio





Changing the Color Mode

You can change the projector's Color Mode using the remote control to optimize the image for your viewing environment.

- Press the [Menu] button on the remote control.
- Select the **Image** menu and press [Enter].



- Select Color Mode and press [Enter].
- Select the color mode you want to use from the list and press [Enter].
- 6 Press [Menu] or [Esc] to exit the menus.

You can set the projector to use these color modes, depending on the input source you are using:



| Dynamic | This is the brightest mode. Best for prioritizing brightness. |
| Normal | This tones down the brightness of the image more than Dynamic , and provides images with natural colors. |

Turning On Automatic Luminance Adjustment

You can turn on Dynamic Contrast to automatically optimize the image luminance. This improves the image contrast based on the brightness of the content you project.

- 1 Turn on the projector and switch to the image source you want to use.
- Press the [Menu] button on the control panel or remote control.

Select the **Image** menu and press [Enter].



- Select **Dynamic Contrast** and press [Enter].
- Choose one of the following options and press [Enter]:



Adjusting the Gamma


You can correct differences in projected image colors that occur between different image sources by adjusting the Gamma setting.

- Turn on the projector and switch to the image source you want to use.




- Select **Advanced** and press [Enter].
- Select **Gamma** and press [Enter].

6 Select and adjust the correction value.



When you select a smaller value, you can reduce the overall brightness of the image to make the image sharper. When you select a larger value, the dark areas of images become brighter, but the color saturation for lighter areas may become weaker.






You can adjust the brightness of your projector's light source.

- Turn on the projector and switch to the image source you want to use.
- Press the [Menu] button on the remote control.
- Select the **Settings** menu and press [Enter].



- A. Select **Brightness Settings** and press [Enter].
- Select **Light Source Mode** and press [Enter].
- **6** Select one of the following options:
 - **Normal** lets you set the brightness to the maximum level. This makes the light source operation time approximately 20,000 hours.
 - Quiet lets you set the brightness to 50% and reduces fan noise. This makes the light source operation time approximately 20,000 hours.
 - Extended lets you set the brightness to 50% and extends the life expectancy of the light source. This makes the light source operation time approximately 30,000 hours.

• **Custom** lets you to select a custom brightness level between 50 to 100%.



If you set the **Light Source Mode** setting to **Custom**, select **Brightness Level** and use the left and right arrow buttons to select the brightness.

For the best results in maintaining a constant brightness, set the **Light Source Calibration** setting to **Run Periodically** in the projector's **Reset** menu.

- You may need to replace internal parts sooner than the estimated light source operation time.



You can adjust the volume of the audio output from the external speaker connected to the Audio Out port.

You can also control the volume for Bluetooth audio devices connected to the projector.

- Turn on the projector and start a presentation.
- To lower or raise the volume, press the [Volume] buttons on the remote control as shown.



A volume gauge appears on the screen.



You can also set the **Volume** setting in the projector's **Settings** menu.



A Caution

Do not start a presentation at a high volume setting. Sudden loud noises may cause hearing loss.

Always lower the volume before powering off, so that you can power on and then gradually increase the volume.



You can use spotlight mode to project a virtual spotlight. Without moving your projector, you can move and customize the position, size, shape and width of the spotlight.




Press the [Spotlight] button on the remote control.

Press the [Effect] button on the remote control to change the overlay effect and shape filter for the spotlight.

Projecting Your Playlists

You can project playlists that contain images and movies.

 - The Epson Projector Content Manager software lets you create playlists and save them on an external storage device. You can also add color and shape effects to your projected image, and schedule playlists.



2 Insert the SD card into the projector's SD card slot.

3 Press the $[SD \triangleright]$ button on the remote control.



The playlist that was played last is projected. If there is a timetable assigned, the playlist will play back according to the schedule in the timetable.



- You can also press numeric buttons to project your favorite playlist. You can set a remote control shortcut key using the software you used to create the playlists.
- To select the target playlist from the list, press the [SD Viewer] button on the remote control, and then use the arrow buttons.



Select the images or movies you want to add to the playlist.




You can upload .avi, .jpeg (.jpg), .png, .bmp, or .gif files. If you want to add .mp4 or .mov files to the playlist, use the Epson Projector Content Manager software or the Epson Creative Projection app.

The selected files are copied to the connected SD card.

- **?** Do one of the following:
 - To add them to the existing playlist, select **Add to Playlist** and select the playlist you want to add them to.
 - To create a new playlist and add them to it, select **Create New Playlist**.

Edit the playlist.



- Edits the playlist name.
- Selects whether to enable repeat playback or not.
- Registers the playlist to your favorites.

 When a playlist has been registered as a favorite, you can start playback quickly using the **Remote** screen or the remote control.
- Displays the images or movies you have added to the playlist. The playlist plays the images or movies in order.
- 6 Adds images or movies to the playlist.
- 6 Deletes images or movies from the playlist.
- Opens the Switch Image screen.
 You can specify the time interval to switch to the next image file. You can also select a transition effect.


- Opens the Effects screen.
 You can add predefined color and shape effect filters to a playlist. You can also create a customized effect.
- Previews the playlist.
- When you have finished editing the playlist, select **Finish**.



- You can play the playlist from the **Remote** or **Playlist** screen.
- When you want to specify when the playlist starts and finishes, schedule the playlist using the Epson Projector Content Manager software.

Projecting One Image Simultaneously (Synchronized Playback)

You can set up a timetable to simultaneously project a synchronized playlist across multiple (up to 16) projectors.






- All projectors that will be involved in synchronized playback must be the same model. If any of the projectors are a different model or have a different resolution, synchronized playback may not be performed properly.
- Make sure the name, date, and time settings are correct for all projectors.
- Connect all projectors to the same network. We recommend connecting over a wired LAN. Otherwise, playback may not be performed simultaneously between projectors depending on the network status.
- Create playlists, set timetables for each of the playlists, and export them to SD cards using the Epson Projector Content Manager software.

- You can also create playlists using Epson Creative Projection, Epson iProjection (Android/iOS), or a Web browser.
- Make sure you prepare the same number of SD cards as there are projectors.

- Press the [SD ▶] button on the remote control.



Synchronized playback starts at the time specified in the playlist timetables.









- To use the effect functions, make sure you perform **Refresh Mode** regularly.
- Reset > Refresh Mode
- This feature is not available in the following situations:
 - When **Edge Blending** is set to **On**.
 - Extended > Multi-Projection > Edge Blending > Edge Blending
- When the source is an SD player and a non-writable error has occurred.
- When the source is an SD player and the playlist cannot be played.

Press the [Effect] button on the remote control.



Select **On** as the **Overlay Effect** setting and press [Enter].



- Select **Shape Filter** and press [Enter].
- Adjust each of the following options as necessary:
 - **Shape** to select the shape effect you want from circles, rectangles, or customized shapes.



You can add your images as customized shapes using the Epson Projector Content Manager software. See the *Epson Projector Content Manager Operation Guide* for details.

- **Filter Effect** to select whether to mask inside or outside of the selected shape.
- Size to set the shape size.
- **Position** to set the shape position.




When you use a customized shape, you cannot change the **Size** and **Position** settings.

- Select **Color Filter** and press [Enter].
- Adjust each of the following options as necessary:
 - Color Filter to select the color.
 - **Custom** to set a customized color by adjusting **Red**, **Green**, and **Blue** individually.
- **7** Select **Lightness** to set the brightness level.
- When you are finished, press [Menu] to exit the menus.

You can temporarily turn off the projected image and sound.

Any sound or video action continues to run, however, so you cannot resume projection at the point that you stopped it.



Press the [A/V Mute] button on the remote control to temporarily stop projection and mute any sound.



2 To turn the image and sound back on, press [A/V Mute] again.


Saving a User's Logo Image

You can save an image on the projector and display it whenever the projector turns on.

This image is called the user's logo screen. You can select a photo, graphic, or company logo as the user's logo, which is useful in identifying the projector's owner to help deter theft. You can prevent changes to the user's logo by setting up password protection.



- If the **User's Logo Protection** setting is set to **On** in the **Password Protection** setting menu, set to **Off** before saving the user's logo.
- When you copy the menu settings from one projector to another using the batch setup feature, user's logo is also copied. Do not register the information that you do not want to share between multiple projectors as a user's logo.
- You cannot save content that is protected by HDCP.
- Display the image you want to project as the user's logo.
- Press the [Menu] button, select the Extended menu, and press [Enter].



Select **User's Logo > Start Setting** and press [Enter].

You see a prompt asking if you want to use the displayed image as a user's logo.



Adjustments such as Keystone, Zoom, Aspect, or Scale are temporarily canceled when you select **User's Logo**.

- Select **Yes** and press [Enter].
- Check the displayed image, and then select **Yes** to save it as the user's logo.

The user's logo is overwritten and a completion message is displayed.

- 6 Press [Esc] to exit the message screen.
- Select the **Extended** menu and press [Enter].
- **8** Select **Display** and press [Enter].
- Select **On** as the **Startup Screen** setting if you want to display the User's Logo screen whenever you turn the projector on.


To prevent anyone from changing the User's Logo settings without first entering a password, set the **User's Logo Protection** setting to **On** in the **Password Protection** setting menu and set the password.

Using Multiple Projectors

You can combine the projected images from two or more projectors to create one unified image area.





- We recommend adjusting the projection angle and setting the focus and zoom at least 20 minutes after you start projecting, because images are not stable right after turning on the projector.
- If the values for **Keystone** are large, it can be difficult to adjust the image position for overlapping images.
- In some cases the brightness and color tone may not match completely even after correction.
- If brightness and color tone differences become more noticeable over time, repeat the adjustments.

For best results, select settings and adjustments for multiple projector images in this order:

- Setting the Projector ID
- Adjusting Color Uniformity
- Blending the Image Edges
- Matching the Image Colors
- Scaling an Image

Projector Identification System for Multiple Projector Control

When lining up multiple projectors to project images, you can correct the brightness and color tone of each projector's image so that the images match closely.

You can set a unique projector ID for each projector to operate them individually using a remote control, and then correct the brightness and color for each projector.


Setting the Projector ID

To control multiple projectors from a remote control, give each projector a unique ID.

- Press the [Menu] button, select the **Extended** menu, and press [Enter].
- Select Multi-Projection and press [Enter].
- Select **Projector ID** and press [Enter].

Using Multiple Projectors

Use the arrow buttons to select the identification number you want to use for the projector. Then press [Enter].




- Press [Menu] or [Esc] to exit the menus.
- Repeat these steps for all the other projectors you want to operate from one remote control.


Selecting the Projector You want to Operate

After setting the projector's ID, select the ID for the projector you want to operate using the remote control.


Aim the remote control at the target projector and press the [ID] button.



The current Projector ID is displayed on the projected screen. It disappears after about 3 seconds.



While holding the [ID] button, press the number button that matches the ID of the projector you want to operate.



The projector you want to operate is selected.



- When you select [0] on the remote control, you can operate all projectors regardless the **Projector ID** setting.
- When you set the **Projector ID** setting to **Off**, you can operate the projector using the remote control whichever ID you select on the remote control.
- The projector ID setting is saved in the remote control. Even if the remote control batteries are removed to replace them, the saved ID setting is retained. However, if the batteries are left out of the remote control for an extended period, the ID returns to its default setting (0).
- When you use multiple remote controls at the same time, you
 may not be able to operate projectors as intended due to
 infrared interference.


Adjusting Color Uniformity

If the color tone on the projected screen is uneven in each projector, adjust the color tone balance using each projector's **Extended** menu.



- The color tone may not be uniform even after performing color uniformity.
- When the Color Mode is set to Dynamic, this function is disabled.
 Image > Color Mode

Press the [Menu] button, select the **Extended** menu, and press [Enter].



- Select Multi-Projection and press [Enter].
- Select Color Uniformity and press [Enter].
- Select Color Uniformity and press [Enter].
- **5** Select **On** and press [Enter]. Then press [Esc].
- 6 Select Adjustment Level and press [Enter].
- **7** Select the level and press [Esc].

There are eight adjustment levels from white through gray, and up to black. You can adjust each level individually.




Select **Start Adjustments** and press [Enter].


Select the area you want to adjust, and press [Enter].



Adjust the circumference first. Finally select **All**, and then adjust the whole screen.

Select the color (**Red**, **Green**, or **Blue**) you want to adjust, and use the left arrow button to weaken the color tone and the right arrow button to strengthen the color tone.






- Press [Esc] to return to the area selection screen.
- Repeat these steps to adjust each area.


- Return to step 6 and adjust other levels.

Blending the Image Edges

You can use the projector's **Edge Blending** feature to create a seamless image from multiple projectors.



Press the [Menu] button, select the **Extended** menu, and press [Enter].




- Select Multi-Projection > Edge Blending, and press [Enter].
- Turn on the Edge Blending, Line Guide, and Pattern Guide settings.




Select the different **Guide Color** setting for each projector so that you can see the blended area clearly.

Select the edge you want to blend on each projector and press [Enter]. You see a screen like this:



- Select the **Blending** setting and select **On**.
- Select the **Blend Range** setting and use the arrow buttons to select the width of the blended area so that the displayed guides are at the edges of the overlapping area between the two images.



7 Press [Esc] to return to the previous screen.


- Select the **Blend Curve** setting and select a gradient for the shaded area on the projectors.
- When the edges are blended, turn off the **Line Guide** and **Pattern Guide** settings on each projector to check the final settings.

Matching the Image Colors

You can match the display quality of multiple projectors that will project next to each other.

Turn on all the projectors and select the **Color Matching** setting in each projector's **Extended** menu so that all the projectors' display quality match on the combined screen.





Scaling an Image


You can project the same image from multiple projectors and use the **Scale** feature to crop and combine them into one large image.



Press the [Menu] button, select the **Extended** menu, and press [Enter].








Select **On** as the **Scale** setting.

- Select one or more of the following scaling options and adjust it as necessary:
 - - or + to scale the image horizontally and vertically at the same time.


- Scale Vertically to scale the image vertically only.
- Scale Horizontally to scale the image horizontally only.
- Select the **Clip Adjustment** setting and use the arrow buttons to adjust the coordinates and size of each image as you view the screen.
- Select **Clip Range** to preview the clipped area you selected.
- When you are finished, press [Menu].

Running Light Source Calibration

Light source calibration automatically adjusts any difference between the white balance and the brightness level of the light source. You should perform light source calibration every 100 hours of projector usage. You can also schedule automatic calibration or run the light source calibration manually using the menus.

Automatic light source calibration may not start in the following conditions:

- Within 20 minutes of turning on the projector.
- When using direct shutdown.
- When you have used the projector continuously for over 24 hours.
- When the projector brightness is automatically dimmed due to high temperatures.
- Press the [Menu] button, select the **Reset** menu, and press [Enter].



- Select **Light Source Calibration** and press [Enter].
- **3** Select any of the following:
 - To run the light source calibration now, select **Run Now**.
 - To automatically run the light source calibration every 100 hours of projector usage, select **Run Periodically**.
 - To schedule automatic calibration, select **Schedule Settings**.

 To check the last time the projector performed a calibration, see Last Run.



If you use the projector continuously for more than 24 hours or use direct shutdown regularly, select **Schedule Settings** to schedule calibration of the light source periodically.

When you are finished, press [Menu] to exit the menus.

You can secure your projector to deter theft or prevent unintended use by setting up the following security features:

 Password security to prevent people who do not know the password from using the projector, and prevent changes to the startup screen and other settings.

This acts as an anti-theft function as the projector cannot be used even if it is stolen, and you can limit who can use the projector.

Password Security Types

You can set up the following types of password security using one shared password:

- Power On Protection prevents anyone from using the projector without first entering a password. When plugging the power cord and turning on the projector at first time, you must enter the correct password. This also applies to Direct Power On and Auto Power On.
- **User's Logo Protection** prevents anyone from changing the custom screen displayed when the projector turns on. The custom screen discourages theft by identifying the projector's owner.
- **Network Protection** prevents anyone from changing the projector's **Network** settings.
- **Schedule Protection** prevents anyone from changing the projector's schedule settings.


Setting a Password

To use password security, you must set a password.



The default password is set to "0000". Change this to your own password.

Hold down the [Effect] button on the remote control for about 5 seconds.




You see the Password Protection setting menu.



If Password Protection is already activated, you must enter the correct password to display the Password Protection setting menu.

Select **Password** and press [Enter].




You see the prompt "Change the password?".

Select **Yes** and press [Enter].



If you select **No**, the Password Protection setting menu is displayed again.

Use the numeric buttons to set a four-digit password.




The password displays as **** as it is entered. A confirmation prompt is displayed when you enter the fourth digit.

- **5** Enter the password again.
 - You see the message "Password accepted". If you enter the password incorrectly, a message is displayed prompting you to re-enter the password.
- 6 Press [Esc] to return to the menu.
- **7** Make a note of the password and keep it in a safe place.

Selecting Password Security Types

After setting a password, you see this menu, allowing you to select the password security types you want to use.



If you do not see this menu, hold down the [Effect] button on the remote control for 5 seconds until the menu appears.

- To prevent unauthorized use of the projector, select **On** as the **Power On Protection** setting.
- To prevent changes to the User's Logo screen or related display settings, select **On** as the **User's Logo Protection** setting.
- To prevent changes to network settings, select **On** as the **Network Protection** setting.
- To prevent changes to the projector's schedule settings, select **On** as the **Schedule Protection** setting.


You can attach the password protect sticker to the projector as an additional theft deterrent.




Be sure to keep the remote control in a safe place; if you lose it, you will not be able to enter the password.

Entering a Password to Use the Projector

When the password screen is displayed, enter the correct password.



Enter the password using the numeric buttons.



The password screen closes.

If the password is incorrect, you see a message and a prompt to try again. Enter the correct password to proceed.

Attention

- If an incorrect password is entered three times in succession, the message "The projector's operation will be locked." is displayed for approximately 5 minutes, and the projector switches to standby mode. If this happens, disconnect the power plug from the electrical outlet, reinsert it, and turn the projector back on. The projector displays the password entry screen again so that you can enter the correct password.
- If you have forgotten the password, make a note of the "**Request Code**: xxxxx" number that appears on the screen and contact Epson for help.
- If you continue to repeat the above operation and input the wrong password 30 times in succession, the message "The projector's operation will be locked. Contact Epson as described in your documentation." is displayed and the projector does not accept any more password entries. Contact Epson for help.

You can execute operations from external sensors connected to the projector.

Depending on the signals from the sensors, you can execute one of the following projector operations that you have already selected in the projector's menu:

- Power On/Power Off
- Execute A/V Mute/Release A/V Mute
- Start Playlist/Stop Playlist
- Source Select
- Light Source Mode: Normal/Light Source Mode: Quiet







To connect the projector to a wired local area network (LAN), use a 100Base-TX or 10Base-T network cable. To ensure proper data transmission, use a Category 5 shielded cable or better.

- Connect one end of the network cable to your network hub, switch, or router.
- **2** Connect the other end of the cable to the projector's LAN port.







- Turns the video and audio on or off temporarily.



When you finish selecting settings, select **Complete** and follow the onscreen instructions to save your settings and exit the menus.



If a critical problem causes a projector to shut down, you may not receive an e-mail alert.


When a problem occurs with a projector on the network, and you selected to receive e-mail alerts, you receive an e-mail containing the following information:

- The email address set in **From** as the mail sender
- **Epson Projector** in the subject line
- The name of the projector experiencing a problem

- The IP address of the affected projector
- Detailed information about the problem

Network administrators can install SNMP (Simple Network Management Protocol) software on network computers so they can monitor projectors. If your network uses this software, you can set up the projector for SNMP monitoring.

- Press the [Menu] button, select the **Network** menu, and press [Enter].
- Select **Network Configuration** and press [Enter].
- **3** Select the **Notifications** menu and press [Enter].



- Set the **SNMP** setting to **On**.
- Enter up to two IP addresses to receive SNMP notifications as the **Trap IP Address 1** and **Trap IP Address 2** settings, using 0 to 255 for each address field.



Do not use these addresses: 224.0.0.0 through 255.255.255.255. This projector supports SNMP agent version 1 (SNMPv1).

6 Enter the SNMP **Community Name** up to 32 alphanumeric characters long.

When you finish selecting settings, select **Complete** and follow the onscreen instructions to save your settings and exit the menus.

You can control the projector from an external device using ESC/VP21.

ESC/VP21 Command List

When the power ON command is transmitted to the projector, the power turns on and it enters warm-up mode. When the projector's power has turned on, a colon ":" (3Ah) is returned.

When a command is input, the projector executes the command and returns a ":", and then accepts the next command.

If the command being processed terminates abnormally, an error message is output and a ":" is returned.

PJLink was established by the JBMIA (Japan Business Machine and Information System Industries Association) as a standard protocol for controlling network-compatible projector's as part of their efforts to standardize projector control protocols.

The projector complies with the PJLink Class2 standard established by the JBMIA.

The port number used for the PJLink search function is 4352 (UDP).

You need to make network settings before you can use PJLink.

It complies with all commands except for the following commands defined by PJLink Class2, and agreement was confirmed by the PJLink standard adaptability verification.



To set up your projector for monitoring and control using a Crestron Connected system, make sure your computer and projector are connected to the network.

If you are connecting wirelessly, set up the projector using the Advanced network connection mode.

Art-Net Channel Definitions







Using the Projector's Menus

You can use the projector's menus to adjust the settings that control how your projector works. The projector displays the menus on the screen.

Press the [Menu] button on the remote control.
You see the menu screen displaying the **Image** menu settings.



Press the up or down arrow buttons to move through the menus listed on the left. The settings for each menu are displayed on the right.



The available settings depend on the current input source.

- To change settings in the displayed menu, press [Enter].
- Press the up or down arrow button to move through the settings.
- Change the settings using the buttons listed on the bottom of the menu screens.
- To return all the menu settings to their default values, select **Reset**.

- When you finish changing settings on a menu, press [Esc].
- Press [Menu] or [Esc] to exit the menus.

Using the Displayed Keyboard

You can use the displayed keyboard to enter numbers and characters.

Transferring Settings From an SD Card

You can copy menu settings from one projector to another of the same model using an SD card.



- Connect an empty SD card. If the SD card contains data other than the batch setup file, the settings may not be saved correctly.
- If you have saved a batch setup file from another projector to the SD card, delete the file or change the file name. The batch setup function cannot overwrite a batch setup file.
- Disconnect the power cord from the projector, and check that all of the projector's indicators have turned off.
- Insert an empty SD card directly to the projector's SD card slot.
- Hold down the [Esc] button on the remote control and connect the power cord to the projector.
- When all of the projector's indicators other than the Wireless LAN indicator turn on, release the [Esc] button.

The indicators start flashing and the batch setup file is written to the SD card. When writing is finished, the projector turns off.



Caution

Do not disconnect the power cord or the SD card from the projector while the file is being written. If the power cord or SD card is disconnected, the projector may not start correctly.

Remove the SD card.



The file name for the batch setup file is PJCONFDATA.bin. If you need to change the file name, add text after PJCONFDATA using only alphanumeric characters. If you change the PJCONFDATA section of the file name, the projector may not be able to recognize the file correctly.

Disconnect the power cord from the projector to which you want to copy settings, and check that all of the projector's indicators have turned off.


- Insert the SD card containing the saved batch setup file to the projector's SD card slot.
- Hold down the [Menu] button on the remote control and connect the power cord to the projector.
- When all of the projector's indicators other than the Wireless LAN indicator turn on, release the [Menu] button.

When all of the indicators start flashing, the settings are being written. When writing is finished, the projector turns off.



⚠ Caution

Do not disconnect the power cord or the SD card from the projector while the file is being written. If the power cord or SD card is disconnected, the projector may not start correctly.

Batch Setup Error Notification

The projector's indicators notify you if an error occurs during a batch setup operation. Check the status of the projector's indicators and follow the instructions described in the table here.

You may need to clean the projector's lens periodically, and clean the air vents to prevent the projector from overheating due to blocked ventilation.

The only parts you should replace are the remote control batteries. If any other part needs replacing, contact Epson or an authorized Epson servicer.



Marning

Before cleaning any part of the projector, turn it off and unplug the power cord. Never open any cover on the projector, except as specifically explained in this manual. Dangerous electrical voltages in the projector can injure you severely.

Clean the projector's lens periodically, or whenever you notice dust or smudges on the surface.

- To remove dust or smudges, gently wipe the lens with lens-cleaning paper.
- To remove stubborn smudges, moisten a soft, lint-free cloth with lens cleaner and gently wipe the lens. Do not spray any liquid directly on the lens.



Marning

Do not use a lens cleaner that contains flammable gas. The high heat generated by the projector may cause a fire.

Attention

Do not use glass cleaner or any harsh materials to clean the lens and do not subject the lens to any impacts; otherwise, it could be damaged. Do not use canned air, or the gases may leave a flammable residue.

Cleaning the Projector Case

Before cleaning the projector case, turn off the projector and unplug the power cord.


- To remove dust or dirt, use a soft, dry, lint-free cloth.
- To remove stubborn dirt, use a soft cloth moistened with water and mild soap. Do not spray liquid directly on the projector.

Attention

Do not use wax, alcohol, benzene, paint thinner, or other chemicals to clean the projector case. These can damage the case. Do not use canned air, or the gases may leave a flammable residue.

• Use a vacuum cleaner to clean dust from the slit in the side of the power supply unit.

Use a vacuum cleaner to remove dust from the front of the air intake vent and the air exhaust vent. Also clean the slit in the side of the power supply unit.



Solutions When No Image Appears

If no image appears, try the following solutions:

- Press the [A/V Mute] button on the remote control to see if the image was temporarily turned off.
- Make sure all necessary cables are securely connected and the power is on for the projector and connected video sources.
- Press the projector's power button to wake it from standby mode. Also, check if the connected computer is in sleep mode or displaying a blank screen saver.
- If the projector does not respond when you press any buttons on the projector, an internal error may have occurred in the projector. Contact Epson for help.
- Adjust the **Brightness** setting in the projector's **Image** menu.
- Adjust the brightness of your projector's light source.
- Settings > Brightness Settings
- Check the **Display** setting in the projector's **Extended** menu to make sure **Messages** is set to **On**.

- The projector may not be able to project copyrighted videos that you play back on a computer. For more details, see the manual supplied with the computer.
- For images projected with Windows Media Center, reduce the screen size from full screen mode.
- For images projected from applications using Windows DirectX, turn off DirectX functions.

Solutions When "No Signal" Message Appears

If the "No Signal" message appears, try the following solutions:

- Press the [HDMI], [LAN], or [SD ▶] button on the remote control to switch the image depending on the input source you want to project.
- Turn on the connected computer or video source, and press play to begin your presentation, if necessary.
- Check that all cables required for projection are securely connected.
- If you are projecting from a laptop computer, make sure it is set up to display on an external monitor.
- If necessary, turn off the projector and the connected computer or video source, and then turn them back on.
- If you are projecting from an HDMI source, replace the HDMI cable with the shorter one.

Displaying From a Windows Laptop

If the message "No Signal" is displayed when projecting from a laptop, you need to set up the Windows laptop to display on an external monitor.

- Hold down the Windows key and press **P** on your keyboard at the same time, then click **Duplicate**.
- If the same image is not displayed by the laptop and projector, check the Windows **Display** utility to make sure the external monitor port is enabled and extended desktop mode is disabled.
- If necessary, check your video card settings and set the multiple display option to Mirror or Duplicate.

Displaying From a Mac Laptop

If the message "No Signal" is displayed when projecting from a Mac laptop, you need to set up the laptop for mirrored display. (See your laptop manual for details.)

- Open the **System Preferences** utility and select **Displays**.
- Select the **Display** or **Color LCD** option, if necessary.
- Click the **Arrange** or **Arrangement** tab.

Solutions When the Image is not Rectangular

Solutions When the Image Contains Noise or Static

If the projected image contains electronic interference (noise) or static, try the following solutions:

- Check the cables connecting your computer or video source to the projector. They should be:
- Separated from the power cord to prevent interference
- Securely connected at both ends
- Not connected to an extension cable
- Check the settings in the projector's **Signal** menu to make sure they match the video source.
- Select a computer video resolution and refresh rate that are compatible with the projector.
- If you adjusted the image shape using the projector controls, try decreasing the **Sharpness** setting in the projector's **Image** menu to improve image quality.
- If you connected an extension power cable, try projecting without it to see if it caused interference in the signal.

Solutions When the Image is Fuzzy or Blurry

If the projected image is fuzzy or blurry, try the following solutions:

- Adjust the image focus.
- Position the projector close enough to the screen.
- Position the projector so the keystone adjustment angle is not so wide that it distorts the image.
- Clean the projector lens.



To avoid condensation on the lens after bringing the projector in from a cold environment, let the projector warm up to room temperature before using it.

Solutions When the Image Brightness or Colors are Incorrect

If the projected image is too dark or light, or the colors are incorrect, try the following solutions:

- Check your video source settings.
- Adjust the available settings in the projector's **Image** menu for the current input source, such as **Color Mode**, **Brightness**, **Contrast**, **Tint**, and **Color Saturation**.
- Make sure you selected the correct **Video Range** setting in the projector's **Signal** menu, if available for your image source.

- Make sure all the cables are securely connected to the projector and your video device. If you connected long cables, try connecting shorter cables.
- Make sure **Brightness Settings** are set correctly.
- Settings > Brightness Settings
- Position the projector close enough to the screen.
- When using multiple projectors, make sure **Light Source Calibration** in the **Reset** menu is set correctly in all of the projectors. If light source calibration is performed only in some of the projectors, the white balance and the brightness level of the projected image may differ between the projectors.

Solutions to Sound Problems

If there is no sound or the volume is too low or high, try the following solutions:

- Adjust the projector's volume settings.
- Press the [A/V Mute] button on the remote control to resume video and audio if they were temporarily stopped.
- Check your computer or video source to make sure the volume is turned up and the audio output is set for the correct source.
- Check the audio cable connections between the projector and your video source.
- Make sure any connected audio cables are labeled "No Resistance".
- If you do not hear sound from an HDMI source, set the connected device to PCM output.
- When you are connecting the projector to a Mac using an HDMI cable, make sure your Mac supports audio through the HDMI port.
- If the volume for the computer is set to the minimum while the projector is set to the maximum, the noise may be mixed. Turn up the computer's volume and turn down the projector's volume. (When you use Epson iProjection (Windows/Mac).)

Solutions to Projector Power or Shut-Off Problems

If the projector does not turn on when you press the power button or it turns off unexpectedly, try the following solutions:

- Make sure the power cord is securely connected to the projector and to a working electrical outlet.
- If the power button on the remote control does not turn on the projector, check its batteries and make sure the remote receiver is turned on in the **Remote Receiver** setting in the projector's **Settings** menu.
- If the projector's light source turns off, the status indicator is flashing, and the temp (temperature) indicator is lit, the projector has overheated and turned off.
- The cooling fans may run in standby status depending on the projector settings. Also, when the projector wakes from standby status, the fans may cause an unexpected noise. This is not a malfunction.
- The power cord may be defective. Disconnect the cord and contact Epson for help.

Solutions to Problems with the Remote Control

If the projector does not respond to remote control commands, try the following solutions:

- Check that the remote control batteries are installed correctly and have power. If necessary, replace the batteries.
- Make sure you are operating the remote control within the reception angle and range of the projector.
- Make sure the projector is not warming up or shutting down.
- Check to see if a button on the remote control is stuck down, causing it to enter sleep mode. Release the button to wake the remote control up.
- Strong fluorescent lighting, direct sunlight, or infrared device signals may be interfering with the projector's remote receivers. Dim the lights or move the projector away from the sun or interfering equipment.
- Make sure the remote receiver is turned on in the **Remote Receiver** setting in the projector's **Settings** menu.
- If the **Remote Receiver** setting is disabled, hold down the [Menu] button on the remote control for at least 15 seconds to reset the setting to its default.
- If you assigned an ID number to the projector to operate multiple projectors from the remote control, you may need to check or change the ID setting.
- If you lose the remote control, you can order another one from Epson.

Solutions to Password Problems

Solutions When Network Alert E-Mails are not Received

If you do not receive an e-mail alerting you to problems with a projector over the network, try the following solutions:

- Make sure the projector is turned on and connected to the network correctly. (If an error shuts down the projector, the email may not be delivered.)

Solutions When the Image Contains Static During Network Projection

If the projected image contains static during network projection, try the following solutions:

- Check for any obstacles between the access point, the computer, the mobile device, and the projector, and change their positions to improve communication.
- Make sure that the access point, the computer, the mobile device and the projector are not too far apart. Move them closer together and try to connect again.
- Check for interference from other equipment, such as a Bluetooth device or microwave. Move the interfering device farther away or expand your wireless bandwidth.
- Reduce the number of connected devices if the connection speed declines.

If you cannot play back a playlist correctly, try the following solutions:

- Make sure the SD card contains a playlist.
- Make sure the SD card is directly inserted to the projector.
- If the SD card is partitioned, you may not be able to play back playlists. Delete all of the partitions before saving the playlists on the SD card.
- If the SD card is write protected, release the write protection from the SD card.
- Do not share a playlist between projectors that are different in resolution. Color and shape effects added by using **Overlay Effect** may not be reproduced correctly.
